Tusen takk to everyone who has donated books to the Bernt Balchen Lodge Viking Library! We continue to add a great selection of Norwegian and Scandinavian-related titles to our collection, thanks to all of you!

In this issue, however, I'd like to highlight some of the historical books we have in our collection, particularly those related to our namesake, Colonel Bernt Balchen. Born on October 23, 1899 near Kristiansand, Balchen was a Norwegian pioneer polar aviator, navigator, aircraft mechanical engineer, and military leader. He later obtained dual Norwegian-American citizenship, served in the U.S. Air Force, and was eventually stationed for a time in Anchorage.

This year marks the 125th anniversary of Balchen's birth, a perfect time to celebrate his many notable achievements.

Bernt Balchen: Polar Aviator by Carroll V. Glines (1999). An extensive biography of Balchen by a retired Air Force colonel.

Hitch your wagon: The story of Bernt Balchen by Clayton Knight and Robert Durham (1950). An account of Balchen's life and the heroic part he played in WWII in the U.S. Army Air Force



The next fifty years of flight, as visualized by Bernt Balchen and told to Erik Bergaust (1954). Details the futuristic vision of aviation by Balchen, as told to aviation journalist and flyer Erik Bergaust.



Poles apart: The Admiral Richard E. Byrd and Colonel Bernt Balchen odyssey by Bess Balchen (2004). An account of the conflict between Balchen and Richard Byrd, written by Balchen's second wife.

Excerpt from Viking Magazine:

Every era has its heroic explorers. At the turn of the last century, it was polar explorers who were among the most famous and admired. Norwegians Fridtjof Nansen and Roald Amundsen were in the forefront of these explorations, and virtually every man, woman, and child in Norway followed their accomplishments.

Bernt Balchen was born in 1899 in Tveit, Norway. His uncle, Oluf Dietrichson, had crossed Greenland on skis with Nansen in 1888. Amundsen was a family friend who Balchen met in 1912, the year after Amundsen became the first person to reach the South Pole. Balchen says in his autobiography that when Amundsen asked him what he wanted to be when he grew up, he answered "I want to be an explorer and go on an expedition with you."

Balchen did become an explorer and participate in one of Amundsen's expeditions. But aircraft—not ships or skis—were his means of exploration.

Norwegian Honorary Consul's and Embassy Staff at the Norwegian Embassy in Washington D.C.

The 27 honorary consuls for the U.S. region regularly meet at the Norwegian Embassy in Washington D.C. for updates and training. This year's meetings included presentations from the Embassy, Innovation Norway, Norwegian Energy Partners (NORWEP), the Norwegian Seafood Council, Invest in Norway, Norwegian Seaman's Church, NorCham, and the Norwegian-American Chamber of Commerce. At this meeting, we reviewed bilateral strategies and priorities, went into depth about the Norway-U.S. relationship with Ambassador Krutnes, and discussed ways that honorary consuls and partnering organizations could support one another. We also heard about plans for Norway's upcoming 2025 bicentennial.

Sjømannskirken – The Norwegian Seamen's Churches are commissioned by the Norwegian Parliament to serve Norwegians abroad. Twenty-eight churches around the world serve over 80 countries. When in Washington D.C. these past few years, I had the pleasure of meeting Pastor Jofrid Landa who works for the Seaman's Church in New York.

The Norwegian Seaman's Church offers comfort to local and travelling Norwegians with religious services and conversations for people during their time of need. I talked with Jofrid about our dear member, Eva Bilet who is now 98 years old and asked Jofrid to please let me know when her work brought her to Alaska so that she could possibly sit and talk with Eva. Jofrid remembered these conversations and called me in April with the great news that she was in Alaska for a day to meet with some students and she had a couple of hours available. Jofrid said she would be delighted to meet with Eva and went to visit her for a heartfelt conversation that ended with the Lord's Prayer which they said in Norwegian.

If you are someone or know of a person in need of services from the Seamen's Church, feel free to reach out to me and I will help facilitate a meeting for you.


