Santa Lucia, or Saint Lucy's Day, is the church feast day dedicated to Saint Lucy and is observed on December 13. Its modern day celebration is generally associated with Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Finland. Santa Lucia comes as a young woman with lights and sweets, marking the return of longer daylight to winter darkness. It is one of the few saint days observed in Scandinavia. At our program at the lodge, a procession is headed by one girl wearing a crown of candles (or lights), while others follow in the procession with girls holding a single candle and boys holding a star.

Children learn and sing Norwegian and Swedish songs, often accompanied by harp and piano. Families are treated to a talent show, singing around the Christmas tree, and enjoy authentic Scandinavian rice pudding, open-faced sandwiches, and desserts. Santa Claus makes a special appearance at this event and hands out goodies to all attending children.



Guided by the Pole Star

Bernt Balchen was an Arctic adventurer, war hero, and pilot's pilot.

[The following article was published in the October 1999 issue of Viking magazine in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of Bernt Balchen's birth. It is reprinted here in part with permission from Viking magazine.]

Every era has its heroic explorers. At the turn of the last century, it was polar explorers who were among the most famous and admired. Norwegians Fridtjof Nansen and Roald Amundsen were in the forefront of these explorations, and virtually every man, woman, and child in Norway followed their accomplishments.

Bernt Balchen was born in 1899 in Tveit, Norway. His uncle, Oluf Dietrichson, had crossed Greenland on skis with Nansen in 1888. Amundsen was a family friend who Balchen met in 1912, the year after Amundsen became the first person to reach the South Pole. Balchen says in his autobiography that when Amundsen asked him what he wanted to be when he grew up, he answered "I want to be an explorer and go on an expedition with you."

Balchen did become an explorer and participate in one of Amundsen's expeditions. But aircraft—not ships or skis—were his means of exploration.

BY INSTRUMENTS AND INSTINCT

When he took his flight training from the Royal Norwegian Naval Air Force in the early 1920s, Balchen was already a seasoned outdoorsperson who had studied forestry and mapped much of the forest in the southern Mandal Valley. He was also a champion athlete who excelled at bicycling, wrestling, and the pentathlon. He had qualified for Norway's Olympic boxing team with an eye to the 1920 games, though he didn't compete there. As a flyer, too, he was superior, and graduated first in his class at the flight training school at Horten.

Balchen met Amundsen again in 1925 on the Norwegian island of Spitsbergen in the Arctic Ocean. Amundsen and the American explorer Lincoln Ellsworth had been forced down while attempting to fly an airplane to the North Pole, and Balchen was a pilot on the search and rescue mission. Amundsen remembered meeting him as a boy and recalled his childhood aspirations. So, the following year, when Amundsen attempted a flight to the North Pole in a dirigible, he decided to draw on Balchen's mechanical expertise and Arctic survival experience. At Amundsen's request, the air force assigned Balchen to the polar expedition.

As the crew made preparations for the dirigible's flight, United States Navy reservist Richard Byrd showed up on Spitsbergen determined to get to the pole first. He would navigate his ski-equipped Fokker trimotor, the Josephine Ford, with navy pilot Floyd Bennett at the controls.

They managed to beat the dirigible into the air by three days and claimed to have reached the pole, though their achievement was later disputed. They never would have gotten off the ground, though, without Balchen's help. After the Josephine Ford crashed on a trial takeoff and its skis were smashed up, Balchen rescued Byrd's hopes and did it with Amundsen's blessings; Amundsen seemed more intent on the success of his own mission than on reaching the pole first. Balchen helped build new skis for the plane from lifeboat oars—the only wood available—and told Byrd's crew how to seal them with a compound of pine resin and tar, how to pack the snow to make a ramp for takeoff, and what time of day and snow conditions would be best for their departure.

Balchen made such an impression on Byrd that the American invited him to come to the United States and join in future expeditions. As a result of the move, Balchen gained dual U.S.-Norwegian citizenship, and became the chief test pilot for the Fokker Aircraft Company in New Jersey. He also trained pilots for the fledgling Western Canada Airways, which was forging routes into the Hudson's Bay area. And on Byrd's next two expeditions, Balchen turned out to be a lifesaver.

In May of 1927, Charles Lindbergh won the Orteig prize by becoming the first to fly across the Atlantic Ocean. But Byrd was still intent on making his own transatlantic flight that year and he chose Balchen and Bert Acosta as his pilots for the June trip. Acosta was not experienced at instrument flying and when the weather turned foggy, he nearly spun the plane into the ocean. Balchen had the necessary skills, took the controls, and completed the flight. At journey's end, when it proved impossible to land in Paris due to bad weather, he saved everyone on board again by turning back to the coast of Normandy and making a night landing in the surf.

On Byrd's November 1929 expedition to the South Pole—the first to reach that pole by air—it was not the weather but Byrd's underpowered and overburdened Ford trimotor airplane that presented a danger. Piloting the plane, Balchen faced the sheer wall of a 9,000-foot glacier and knew he couldn't gain sufficient altitude to clear the top. He called for the crew to jettison more than 200 pounds of provisions and flew to the very edge of the wall to catch a thermal updraft that carried the plane up and over.

His skill and instincts gained Balchen high regard among his fellow flyers. According to Dr. Paul Garber, curator emeritus of the National Air and Space Museum, Balchen was the one pilot universally trusted by other pilots. Amelia Earhart sent Balchen a telegram after she became the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic in 1932. He had coached her on instrument flying and made improvements to her airplane before the trip. "Your help made it possible," she wrote.

AN ALLY IN WAR

With his friend Hjalmar RiiserLarsen, Balchen established Det Norske Luftfartsselskap, the Norwegian Airline, and served as its operations manager from 1935 to 1940. Business travel gave him the opportunity to observe events in Germany in the late 1930s. He aided the United States by reporting German violations of the 1918 Versailles Treaty to the American government.

Balchen was in the United States when Germany invaded Norway in 1940. On orders from the Norwegian government-in-exile he went to Canada to choose a training site for an independent Norwegian air force. He selected City Island, outside of Toronto, Ontario. It was eventually known as "Little Norway," and served as a magnet for any young Norwegian pilot who could manage to get there during the war.

Balchen was ferrying planes to England in 1941 when General Hap Arnold persuaded him to join the U.S. Army Air Corps. Arnold knew that Balchen had experience with construction projects in subfreezing conditions and put him in charge of building a fueling base in Greenland. In record time, Balchen and his crew built the Bluie West 8 Air Base at Sondre Stromfjord on Greenland's west coast. Anticipating that some planes would encounter bad weather or mechanical problems while flying over Greenland, Balchen also trained his unit—most of them construction people—in the skiing and survival techniques that would be needed to rescue downed airmen. They carried out scores of rescues on Greenland's icecap and Balchen was involved in more than 100 of them.

Throughout the Second World War, Balchen was also involved in clandestine operations, including supply drops for the Norwegian Resistance. He was appointed Chief of the Allied Transport Command for Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, and the USSR, and evacuated nearly 4,500 allied flyers and refugees from neutral Sweden to Great Britain without the loss of a single plane. At the end of the war, in Bodø, Norway, Balchen personally accepted the surrender of the German Air Command.

CHANGING COMMERCIAL AVIATION

His years of Arctic experience convinced Balchen that the region could be a valuable shortcut for commercial aviation between North America and Europe. As president of the Norwegian Airlines from 1945 to 1948, he championed polar routes. He also facilitated the merger of the Danish, Norwegian, and Swedish airlines into the Scandinavian Airline System (SAS) in 1946.

The Cold War called him back to active duty in the United States Air Force in 1948. His leadership in the construction of Thule Air Base in northwestern Greenland in 1952 may have been the most important contribution to America's defense in that era: Thule was the only American airfield from which bombers could reach the industrial heartland of the Soviet Union—an effective deterrent against Soviet aggression.

Balchen retired at the rank of Colonel in 1956, when he was the top Arctic consultant for the Secretary of the Air Force. Until the end of his life in 1973, he also served as a consultant to the aviation and energy industries, and was available to the Air Force for special assignments. Having served both his native and adopted countries admirably, he was buried with honors at Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia.

In Remembrance



Grethe Synove Berge passed away peacefully at her beloved cabin in the Big Lake, Alaska, area on Sept. 1, 2024, at the age of 92. She passed the day after spending a happy evening celebrating her 93rd birthday with her loving family and close friends. She was just two days shy of turning 93.

Grethe was born on Sept. 3, 1931, in Strommen, Norway. She grew up during World War II, witnessing and experiencing more than her share of hardships. After finishing school in Norway she worked in England for a short time before becoming a flight attendant for Scandinavian Airlines.
